

Dress Code Guide

(Revised 7/14/2010)

Good guidelines for appearance should lie somewhere between the limits of personal freedom and Christian responsibility. Although styles change, some of today's styles are decidedly inappropriate and are unbecoming to a person who wishes to glorify God in all he/she does. A submissive and teachable attitude about appearance is of great importance. (1 Peter 3:4)

BOYS

- ◆ Any **solid color** uniform slacks, cargo pants, corduroys, or jeans. No holes, tears, or fraying—we are going for a clean and tidy appearance. No shorts.
- ◆ Any **solid, striped, or plaid color** polo, turtleneck, or **collared** button down shirt, sweatshirt, or sweater: long or short sleeve, no graphics of any kind, logos must be less than 2 inches in size. If shirt is designed to be worn tucked in, it should be tucked in.
- ◆ Shoes can be any color and must have no inappropriate logos or graphics (example: skulls, dragons, etc.) No flip flops.
- ◆ All facial hair must be clean shaven.
- ◆ Hair is to be neat and out of the eyes: no longer than collar length in back.
- ◆ School t-shirts are allowed on Thursdays only.
- ◆ Piercing of any kind not allowed.

GIRLS

- ◆ Any **solid color** skirts, skorts, jumpers or uniform slacks, capris (well-below the knee), or jeans. No holes, tears, or fraying—we are going for a clean and tidy appearance. No shorts. Skirts and dresses should be touching the knees.
- ◆ Any **solid, striped, or plaid color** polo, turtleneck, or collared button down shirt, sweatshirt, or sweater: long or short sleeve, no graphics of any kind, logos must be less than 2 inches in size.
- ◆ Shoes can be any color and must have no inappropriate logos or graphics (example: skulls, dragons, etc.) No flip flops.
- ◆ Shirts need to be long enough that when you raise your hands over your head, your midsection does not show.
- ◆ School t-shirts are allowed on Thursdays only.
- ◆ No more than two sets of earrings. Modest rings, necklaces, and bracelets.

The dress code is to be kept for all school programs and functions even when the student is attending, but not participating.
